OVERVIEW OF BANKRUPTCY

- a. The parties in a bankruptcy case
 - i. Debtor
 - ii. Creditor
 - iii. Trustee
 - 1. Chapter 7 Trustees
 - a. Come from a panel set up by the local United States Trustee
 - b. A trustee can be elected by creditors if enough will participate in voting. Rare. Bk Code Section 702
 - c. The United States Trustee can act as the Ch. 7 Trustee
 - 2. Duties of a Ch. 7 Trustee
 - a. Bk Code Sec. 704 sets out the basic duties
 - b. Trustee is a fiduciary
 - c. Primary duties:
 - i. Sell assets and hold the funds,
 - ii. Investigate the financial affairs of the debtor,
 - iii. Examine claims and object to defective claims,
 - iv. Furnish information to any party in interest abut the case,
 - v. Make a final report and account of funds handled,

- vi. Fulfill the health care business duties
- d. Trustee presides at the Bk Code Sec. 341 meeting of creditors
- e. Bk Code Sec. 323: Trustee is the representative of the estate and can sue and be sued
- f. 28 USC Sec. 959: Trustee can be sued for his actions. Trustee must comport w/ applicable state law as if the owner of the asset involved
- g. 18 USC Sec. 3057: Trustee must report any known violation of federal law relating to insolvency to the U.S. Attorney
- h. A trustee can run a business long enough to sell it (Bk Code Sec. 721)
- 3. Corporate Trustee acquires right to waive Attorney-Client Privilege
 - a. Commodity Futures Trading Commission v. Weintraub: Trustee's power to waive debtor's attorney-client privilege
- 4. Trustee Quasi-Judicial Immunity
 - a. Trustees are cloaked in quasi-judicial immunity from suit. Curry v. Castillo, 297 F.3d 940 (9th Cir. 2002)
 - b. This flows from the roles of the trustee as a party exercising quasi-judicial authority
 - c. The U.S. Trustee has the same protection, at minimum
- 5. Ch. 7 Trustee Compensation
 - a. Bk Code Sec. 326 governs
 - b. Up to:

- i. 25% of the first \$5K
- ii. 10% of the next \$45K
- iii. 5% of the next \$950K
- iv. 3% of the next dollars
- c. Bk Code Section 330 authorizes the payment in the Bk Court's discretion
- d. If no funds are handled, the fee awarded is \$60
- 6. Ch. 7 Trustee Prohibitions
 - a. Trustees and everyone else in the bk process are subject to federal criminal statutes. See, 18 USC Sections 151-158
 - b. It is illegal to:
 - i. Conceal assets
 - ii. Bribe or embezzle
 - iii. Purchase from an estate where acting as trustee
 - iv. Make any deals to fix fees for work done
 - c. Bk Code Sec. 363(n) makes rigging the bidding at a sale grounds to set aside the sale
- 7. Ch. 7 Trustee Team
 - a. Trustee has staff in an office who assist the trustee
 - b. Banks offer sophisticated software to assist case and financial management

- c. Trustee can hire professionals. Bk Code Sec. 327. This can include lawyers, accountants, auctioneers, and others
- d. "Professional" is not a defined term. It has localized meaning
- e. The professionals have to be disinterested to qualify for employment. See, Bk Code Sec. 101(14) for definition
- f. Court approval is needed to be employed
- g. Sometimes the trustee's law firm can act as his counsel. Bk Code Sec. 327(d)
- h. Finally, the trustee can hire "special counsel" for limited purposes who has no conflict on the limited matter
- i. If disinterestedness is absent or count approval is n/ obtained, the work may not be compensated

8. Ch. 13 Trustee's Duties

- a. These are listed in Bk Code Sec. 1302(b)
- These include being accountable for funds held, investigating the debtor, examining and objecting to claims, providing information if asked, and filing a final report. These are the same as in Ch. 7
- c. There is no right to liquidate any asset. Ch. 13 does n/contemplate payment via forced liquidation
- d. The Trustee shall:
 - i. Appear at any hearing on the approval of the debtor's plan, if there are concerns
 - ii. Assist the debtor in performing the plan (some trustees offer financial education classes)

- iii. Ensure that the debtor makes plan payments
- iv. Give notice to any holder of a domestic support obligation (Bk Code Sec. 101(14a)) of the case and various collection rights

9. Ch. 13 Trustee Compensation and Team

- a. Ch. 13 trustee heads up a large office staff compared to a Ch. 7 trustee
- b. This staff is necessary to collect, manage, pay out and account for the payments of hundreds of active Ch. 13 plans
- c. The compensation of a Ch. 13 trustee is capped by statute
- d. Legal services are provided by on-staff lawyers in the Ch. 13 office
- e. There are regular audits of all the accounts of all bankruptcy trustees

iv. U.S. Bankruptcy Judge

- 1. The judicial officer that presides over a bk case
- 2. Bk judges are not Article III judges with lifetime tenure, but instead serve as judicial officers of the district court
- 3. Appointed for 14-year terms by the court of appeals for the circuit
- 4. Bk judges function as a unit of the Article III district court. They hear and determine cases and proceedings by reference from the district court
- 5. A distinction is made between "core proceedings," in which a bk judge may enter final orders which are reviewable only on appeal, and non-core proceedings, in which the bk judge must submit

proposed findings of fact and conclusions of law to the district court for de novo review

v. U.S. Trustee

- 1. Office of the U.S. Trustee
 - a. The quality control and oversight agency in the bk world
 - b. It is a part of the U.S. Dept. of Justice
 - c. Its employees are federal employees
 - d. Staff consists of attorneys, accountants, and support personnel
 - e. The office typically is small compared to the work it has
 - f. U.S. Trustee cooperates w/ the U.S. Attorney's Office in criminal investigations and prosecutions

2. Role of the U.S. Trustee

- a. 28 USC Section 586 gives it duties
- b. It has no single client in a bk case
- c. It has standing to appear in any case and be heard
- d. It oversees the Ch. 7 and 13 trustees
- e. It has a major role in implementing the Means Test

3. U.S. Trustee Guidelines

a. The local United States Trustee has guidelines dictating the procedures to follow in a variety of situations, including fee applications, the hiring of professionals in bk cases, and numerous Ch. 11 procedures

- b. Bk judges will often treat these guidelines as mandatory local rules
- c. The national and local United States Trustees have a website
